APPLICATION TO REVIEW A LICENCE – Bell's Convenience

1.0 Purpose of the report:

1.1 To consider an application by the Weights and Measures to review the Premises Licence issued in respect of Bell's Convenience, 152 Palatine Road.

2.0 Recommendation(s):

2.1 The panel is requested to determine the review application.

3.0 Reasons for recommendation(s):

- 3.1 This application must be determined by a panel.
- 3.2a Is the recommendation contrary to a plan or strategy adopted or approved by the Council?
- 3.2b Is the recommendation in accordance with the Council's approved Yes budget?
- 3.3 Other alternative options to be considered:

None, once an application for the review of a Premises Licence is received it must be considered by a Licensing Panel.

4.0 **Background Information**

4.1 Bell's Convenience , 151 Palatine Road Blackpool has the benefit of a premises licence authorising the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises Monday-Saturday 07.00 - 22.00, Sunday 10.00 - 16.00

- 4.2 On 1st July 2015 the Licensing Service received an application from Weights and Measures to review this licence on the grounds of crime and disorder, public safety and protection of children from harm. A copy of the application is attached.
- 4.3 Representations in support of the application have been received from the Police, Licensing Authority and Health and Safety. Copies of the representations are attached.
- The licence holder at the time the review was submitted was Amer Khan. On 17th July 2015 an application was received to transfer the licence to Jeyabalan Sornalingam.

4.5 Local policy considerations

None

4.6 National policy considerations

Section 11 reviews is relevant in particular:

11.20 – In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response.

If a suspension or revocation is being considered 11.23 should be taken into account "it will always be important that any detrimental financial impact that may result from a licensing authority's decision is appropriate and proportionate to the promotion of the licensing objectives. But where premises are found to be trading irresponsibly, the licensing authority should not hesitate, where appropriate to do so, to take tough action to tackle the problems at the premises and, where other measures are deemed insufficient, to revoke the licence."

The panel have the following powers:

- 1. Take no action
- 2. Modify the conditions of the licence (by adding removing or varying conditions)
- 3. Exclude a licensable activity from the licence
- 4. Remove the DPS
- 5. Suspend the licence for up to three months
- 6. Revoke the licence.

4.7 Observations

This licence was granted in 2006 and has the following conditions endorsed:

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- 1 No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence
 - a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence,

or

- b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2 Every supply of alcohol under the premise licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol. The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 year of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- All staff to have received suitable training in relation to the proof of age scheme to be applied upon the premises. Records to evidence this will be made available to an authorised officer upon request.
- The Licence holder is to support and rigorously enforce Challenge 21 or similar company policy proof of age policy.

Any person who looks or appears to be under the age of 21 shall be asked to provide identification that they are over the age of 18. The following are the only forms of identification acceptable: -

- UK photo driving licence
- ii. Passport
- iii. Proof of Age Standards Scheme Card
- 3 The premises are to be equipped with a closed circuit television system, which

is appropriate to its purpose and provided and maintained to the satisfaction of enforcement Authorities.

- 4 A clear, legible and conspicuous notice requesting patrons to avoid causing noise, nuisance or disturbance to local residents shall be displayed at every exit.
- Access of spirits will be restricted to the secure staff area and sale and supply will be by assistant only.
- The premises are operated in accordance with the principles outlined by the 'Nightsafe' Initiative, as are relevant to those premises, and indicated in the associated leaflet.
- 7 The wall between the shop and 149 Palatine Road shall be soundproofed.
- 8 Litter bins are to be provided by the licence holder.

The review is brought on behalf of the Weights and Measures Authority following concerns that the Licensing Objectives are not being properly promoted when the premises are selling alcohol.

In brief our concerns are that:

- On the 17th April 2015 a test purchase of alcohol was successfully conducted at these licenced premises using an underage volunteer.
- On the 1st June 2015, Sornalingam Jeyabalan (the Seller) accompanied by Siuakuman Sivatharsan (friend) attended Intervention meeting, explained that he (Jeyabalan) had purchased the business from Amer Khan during December 2014. The seller was adamant that he had purchased the business from Khan and produced documentary evidence supporting his claim regarding the transfer of ownership of the stock, and had taken over the running the business. Jeyabalan provided a copy of a receipt for his Personal Licence dated 4th December 2014. In addition he produced a series of documents relating to the supply and sale of Alcohol included with in this bundle.
- The records of the Premise Licence PL1622 do not indicate a change of Premise Licence Holder or Designated Premise Supervisor.
- Historically the operation of this premise appear to have been somewhat chaotic; failure to pay the annual renewal fee and subsequent suspensions, intimates that either the LS/F/005/12/1

Designated Premise Supervisor hasn't been overseeing the day to day running of business; or that there has been a significant or prolonged absence of any responsible persons from the licenced premises and a lack of respect for the licensing objectives.

In respect of the failed test purchase, it is an offence to sell alcohol to a person under the age of 18 years by virtue of **Section 146 of the Licensing Act 2003.** A person guilty of an offence under this section is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 5 on the standard scale.

Circumstances

On the 17th April 2015 at 17:38 a 16 year old male volunteer purchased 10 bottles of Carlsberg for £7.25 from Sornalingam Jeyabalan, an employee of Amer Khan. Jeyabalan was cautioned following the sale and issued with a Notice of Alleged Offence. (Jeyabalan gave Khan's name as the proprietor/representative).

On the 18th May 2015, I wrote to Amer Khan at the shop and his home address inviting him to attend an Intervention Meeting on the 1st June 2015. During the Interim Period I didn't receive a response from Mr Khan or his representatives suggesting that the business had changed ownership.

On the 1st June 2015, Sornalingam Jeyabalan (the Seller) accompanied by Siuakuman Sivatharsan (friend) attended the meeting, Jeyabalan explained that he had purchased the business from Amer Khan during December 2014 and produced a number of documents allegedly supporting his claim. The seller was adamant that he had purchased the business from Khan claiming to have further documentary evidence to prove the transfer of ownership, and that he was running the business.

I assume that the English isn't Mr Jeyabalan first language, as he appeared to be confused over an application he'd made to London Borough of Brent for a Premise Licence which he claimed he'd not received.

Yet when pressed over claims couldn't explain why

on the evening of the sale he gave Khan's as the name owner

or

 why his name wasn't recorded either as the Premise Licence Holder or the Designated Premise Supervisor.

In order to expedite the matter in regards to the seller, Sornalingam Jeyabalan accepted the offer of a Conditional Caution comprising of a Simple Caution.

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If Khan no longer had interest in the business then the new owner has failed to obtain the relevant qualification or approval to be deemed Designated Premise Supervisor.

Enquiry lodged with London Borough of Brent regarding Jeyabalan's Personal Licence application (awaiting response)

In either case, the events that have taken place strongly suggest that there is a negligent relaxed approach to the premises licence and the licensing objectives, highlighted further by the fact that Amer Khan remains the Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premise Supervisor when allegedly he has no further interest in the premise.

I am the above named and am employed as a Public Protection Officer within the Trading Standards (Enforcement) Section of Blackpool Council. In this role I am authorised to enforce the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003. On the 17th April 2015 I was the lead officer on an underage sales operation, using underage volunteers to attempt to test purchase alcohol from a series of shops. I produce a photograph of volunteer one as exhibit SJA/BC/1 and of volunteer two as exhibit SJA/BC/2. These two volunteers would enter licenced premises as instructed as a team and jointly purchase alcohol. The choice of alcohol was at the volunteer's discretion. At 17:38 the volunteers entered Bells Convenience, 151 Palatine Road, Blackpool, FY1 4DN and emerged a short time later with 10 bottles of Carlsberg. Immediately following this sale myself and PC (3842) Lisa Evans from Blackpool Police's Licensing Unit entered Bells Convenience and I introduced ourselves. I explained that a sale of alcohol had been made to our underage volunteers and that they were fifteen and sixteen years old respectively. A male who gave his name as Sornal Jeyabalan identified himself as the person who had made the sale. He gave his address as and his date of I have since found out that his full name is Somalingham Jeyabalan. I issued Mr Jeyabalan with a Notice of Alleged Offence, a copy of which I produce as exhibit SJA/BC/3. Mr Jeyabalan was very apologetic and insisted that it was a genuine mistake and that he had never sold previously. On the 1st June 2015 Mr Jeyabalan was issued with, and

This shop operates a 'Challenge 25 Policy in relation to both the sale of alcohol and tobacco. It is a criminal offence to supply either alcohol or tobacco to anyone under the legal age limit. Members of staff must ask for identification when there is any possibility that the customer may be less than 25 years of age. Failure to seek such identification will be treat as a fundamental breach of contract.

The only acceptable forms of identification are:-

- 1. A Passport or
- 2. A Driving Licence or
- An Approved 'Proof of Age' Scheme Card. 3.

A Refusals Register is kept on the premises and its position is known to all members of staff. A log record must be made in the following circumstances:-

- A person is unable to produce suitable proof of age and is refused sale. 1. 2.
- A person seeks to purchase alcohol or cigarettes and is refused sale for any other reason.

It should also show that staff have read and understood all the information supplied. You then need to keep this record to show that the training has been completed.

BLACKPOOL COUNCIL/LANCASHIRE POLICE RESPONSIBLE RETAILERS' SCHEME

Trading Standards and the Police were appointed to find a way of working with retailers in an attempt to reduce sales of age related products.

It is clear that some guidance will be given by the partner agencies by way of an Information Pack.

This Information Pack will provide clear information on the law and advice on good practice measures you should adopt to prevent such sales taking place.

This Scheme will, hopefully, operate alongside other initiatives involving local schools. These will not only tackle health education on smoking and drinking, but also will encourage young people themselves to get involved in addressing the issues.

Once the Responsible Retailers' Scheme is active, and you sign up to this, whilst meeting the criteria, you will be awarded a Certificate to display at your premises. This, together with other promotional material provided, will show your customers and other traders that you are supporting this valuable community project.

We appreciate that it can be very difficult for you to judge the age of a young person (Challenge 21 & 25) and we also realise that the vast majority of retailers take these matters seriously. Having said all that, the few who do not comply often receive bad publicity which affects the whole trade.

This is your chance to show that you are doing something positive to tackle problems.

I have provided a few handouts, most of which you have seen before, but it is simply meant to re-enforce our commitment to this Scheme.

There is an Information Sheet for each of the following products -

- Alcohol
- Tobacco
- Solvents (Glue, Lighter Fuel, etc)
- Fireworks
- > Videos
- Lottery Tickets
- Knives

There is also a selection of advice on best practice, ideas you can use to make life easier for you and your staff.

A check Sheet is provided for you and your staff to sign. This will go some way towards their training (due diligence).

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BEING A RESPONSIBLE RETAILER

- Requirements for best practice

Putting some or all of these measures in place will help you demonstrate you are taking 'all reason able precautions and exercising all due diligence'. This is what the Courts would look at should a sale take place. What is 'reasonable' will be different for a small business than for a large national chain.

- All staff must understand the law in these areas. They will need training to help them. This should be done on a regular basis. New staff must be trained before being involved in the sale of age restricted products. Keep a record of any training or updates. This pack is a good start.
- Keep a Refusal Register. This records details of any sales you refuse and the name of staff involved. It shows diligence. I can also act as a deterrent to young people attempting to buy. Refusal sheets are included in this pack.
- Implement a policy of not selling to anyone wearing a school uniform
- Do not sell to anyone you suspect of buying on behalf of underage youngster.
 You are perfectly at liberty to do this even if they are old enough to buy.
- Ensure senior staff and managers give support and back-up to staff who decide to refuse a sale.
- A Policy of 'NO PROOF OF AGE NO SALE' is sensible. Encourage staff to ask for proof of age for all customers who appear to be under the age of 21. Only accept proof of age with photos.
- Use till prompts at the point of sale. This can be a scanned bar code message, stickers, or posters. A printed till prompt is included in this pack.
- Owners/Managers/Area Managers must regularly check the statutory signs are displayed, the training records and refusals logs are maintained and support staff who refuse sales. You may decide to keep records of these checks.

PROOF OF AGE

- One of the easiest ways to satisfy yourself a customer can buy an age restricted product is to ask for some form of Proof of Age.
- If young people can buy legally, it will be in their own interest to carry a Proof of Age card.
- The more youngsters are asked for acceptable Proof of Age the more inclined they will be to carry one.
- Police and Trading Standards recommend you only accept Proof of Age with date of birth <u>and</u> a photo.

Acceptable Proof of Age includes -

- 10 year Passport
- New photo Driving Licence
- Blackpool Council Proof of Age
- Citizen Card
- There are fake Proof of Age cards about so if you are unhappy with a card for any reason, refuse the sale.
- Items such as Birth Certificates and National Insurance Cards are not recommended. They carry no photo so can be passed between friends.
- You legally have the right to refuse any customer either over or under age if you
 are unhappy with the sale in any way.

Remember -

BETTER SAFE THAN SORRY - IF <u>YOU</u> MAKE A SALE
<u>YOU</u> WILL BE RESPONSIBLE

HOW TO REFUSE A SALE

Sometimes if you refuse a sale the customer may get angry. To help you handle difficult situations -

- Ask for Proof of Age. This diffuses the situation as it is not a direct refusal. It
 puts the onus on them to produce Proof of Age. Only accept Proof of Age with a
 photo and only then if you are happy it is genuine. If they have no acceptable
 Proof of Age you can offer them an application form to obtain some.
- Refuse politely. If necessary repeat your refusal clearly.
- Keep calm. Do not get into an argument.
- Explain briefly why you cannot sell. Try -

'Our company policy is not to sell these products to young people'.

'I am sorry, if I sold you this, I may be breaking the law'.

'We have a policy of No Proof of Age, No Sale'.

- Draw their attention to posters and stickers which indicate you will not sell these substances.
- Be positive in your refusal. Have a firm tone of voice, be confident and use direct eye contact. The law is on your side and you are doing the right thing.
- Call your supervisor or manager for support if necessary.
- · Enter details in the Refusal Register.



Trading Standards Officers are expected to ensure that the law is followed and will carry out test purchases of age restricted products as part of their enforcement duties.

Any test purchases using young volunteers that could result in legal proceedings (prosecution) will be carried out according to Home Office guidelines. This practice is not deemed as entrapment.

Following the guidelines in this pack and asking for proof of age should ensure that you and your staff do not make a sale.



Please make sure all your staff have read and understood these points -

- It is illegal to supply any fireworks to a person under the age of 18 (except the following - crackers, caps, party poopers, serpents and novelty matches and throwdowns, for which the age limit is 16).
- If you are not sure of the customer's age and they appear to be under 21, ask for proof. IF YOU ARE STILL NOT SURE, REFUSE THE SALE.
- If you break the law and sell to a child under 18, you can be fined £5,000 and/or serve six months imprisonment.
- The same penalties apply for breaking down boxes of fireworks to sell singly.
- It is an offence to supply certain fireworks to ANY member of the general public.
 These will be labelled 'This device must not be sold to, or used by, a member of the general public.
- Only some sparklers and large individual fireworks can be sold unpacked. All
 other fireworks must be sold in manufacturers' boxes. These should not be
 removed and sold separately.
- Premises used for storing fireworks (including caps and throwdowns) must be registered with the Trading Standards Service. There are rules governing safe storage of fireworks. Contact the Service for further guidance.
- Observe the Industry Code of Practice which has agreed fireworks should only be on general sale to the public for the three weeks leading up to 5th November and a few days afterwards. In addition, fireworks can also be sold between 9th December and 1st January.
- Display safety leaflets featuring the Firework Code. These should be available from your supplier, Trading Standards or the DTI, free of charge.
- Trading Standards Officers are responsible for enforcing the law on illegal sales
 of fireworks. If you require further advice, please contact Blackpool Trading
 Standards on tradstand@blackpool.gov.uk or 01253 478381.

ILLEGAL SALES OF LOTTERY TICKETS

Please make sure all your staff have read and understood these points -

- It is illegal to sell lottery tickets to any person under the age of 16.
- If you are not sure of the customer's age and they appear to be under 21, ask for proof. IF YOU ARE STILL NOT SURE, REFUSE THE SALE.
- If you break the law and sell to a child under 16, you can be fined £5,000 and/or serve two years imprisonment.
- This legislation applies to all lotteries, i.e. National Lottery, local lotteries and all scratch cards.
- Any retailer who makes an illegal sale of a National Lottery ticket or scratch card may lose their terminal and/or right to sell National Lottery products.

Why are cigarettes age-restricted?

- You must be at least 18 years old to buy cigarettes and tobacco products.
- Research has shown that the longer young people are prevented from starting a habit the better their chance of not becoming addicted in later life. That is why it's important that young people's access to tobacco is restricted until they are old enough to understand the effects that smoking can have on their health. Smoking causes many serious illnesses like bronchitis, heart
- Once you start smoking it is hard to kick the habit as the nicotine contained in tobacco is a very addictive drug which causes changes in the brain that make people want to use it more and more.

Who can be fined for buying or selling cigarettes and tobacco products?

- If a shopkeeper or one of the shop assistants sells cigarettes or tobacco products to anyone under 18, they are committing an offence and both could be fined up to £2,500.
- It is illegal for somebody over 18 to buy cigarettes for another person who is under the age of 18.
- Selling cigarettes which have been split from a pack to any adult or child is also an offence which carries a fine of £1,000.

Knife crime - the impact on the community

- Fatal stabbings have a dramatic impact on the victim's family, friends and the local community.
 Even where violent crime does not result in death or serious injury, victims and family often suffer long term trauma.
- Police are routinely issued with stab-proof vests, however in a worrying sign
 of the times in some parts of the country even paramedics are issued
 with stab-proof vests.

Knives - the law

- Every year many people are badly injured or killed by knives. Such items are age-restricted because of the number of crimes involving the use of offensive weapons.
- It is illegal for any shop to sell a knife of any kind (including cutlery and kitchen knives) to anyone under the age of 18.
- If someone sells a knife to a person under 18 they commit an offence and could be fined up to £5000 or sent to prison for up to six months.
- The maximum penalty for carrying a knife is four years in prison and a fine of £5000.
- It is an offence to carry a knife in public without good reason or lawful authority (for example, a good reason is a chef on the way to work carrying their own knives).
- If a knife is used in a threatening way (even a legal knife, such as a Swiss Army knife) it is regarded as an 'offensive weapon' by the law.
- Police have 'Stop and Search' powers and have the right to search any person or vehicle, if they
 suspect a possible offence—including carrying an offensive weapon.
- School staff in England have the povier to search, withdot consent, any pupil they suspect or carrying a knife or other weapon in school, or on an educational visit.

I am in receipt of a review application submitted by Blackpool Trading Standards for the above premises and on behalf of the Chief Officer of Police wish to make a representation in support of that review

On Friday 17th April 2015 the premises failed a Test Purchasing Operation, whereby a 15 & 16 year old male volunteers were serve a 10 pack of lager. The Dps at the time as sated on the current premises licence was not present. The seller Sornalingham JEYABALAN informed officers that he had been working at the premises for 3 months and could not show us any of his Proof of age training.

On the evening JEYABALAN had no proof of due diligence available to see at the time, and no authorisation of sales document showing who was approved to sell alcohol on behalf of the DPS. There was also no refusals register and a limited amount of posters in store in relation to challenge `25`. The premises licence was also not on display. During our visit at no point and even when asked was it pointed out that Mr Khan was no longer the current DPS/PLH.

During a follow up intervention it became apparent that Mr Khan had nothing to do with the current operation of the business and Mr JEYABALAN believed that he had the day to day running of the

operation.

The police have serious concerns that there is no responsible person in place and have not been since December 2014 and that the Proof of Age training is not being adopted. The Police have limited confidence that the promotion of the Licensing Objectives is being upheld.

Action Taken: TEST PURCHASE OPERATION CONDUCTED BY THE POLICE AND TRADING STANDARDS WITH A 15 YEAR OLD & 16 YEAR OLD MALE TEST PURCHASERS. PURCHASERS ENTERED BELLS, PALATINE ROAD AND PURCHASED A 10 PACK OF CARLSBERG PRICED AT £7.25, WHICH WAS THEN SOLD TO THEM BY THE MALE BEHIND THE COUNTER. THE SELLER DID NOT ASK FOR I.D TO BE PRODUCED OR CHALLENGE THEIR AGE.

ON THE EVENING TRADING STANDARDS OFFICER STEVE ASH AND POLICE OFFICER P.C EVANS ENTERED THE SHOP TO INFORM THEM OF THE SALE AND IDENTIFY THE SELLER. THE MALE BEHIND THE COUNTER GAVE HIS DETAILS AS SORNAL JEYABOLAN HE WAS INFORMED THAT HE HAD JUST SOLD ALCOHOL TO VOLUNTEERS UNDER 18 AND WAS SHOWN A PICTURE OF THE MALES WHICH HE ACCEPTED HE HAD BEEN THE SELLER.

MR JEYABOLON STATED THAT HE HAD NOT SOLD TO ANYONE UNDER AGE BEFORE AND THAT HE HAD MADE A MISTAKE, I ASKED HIM HOW LONG HE HAD BEEN WORKING AT THE SHOP FOR AND HE STATED 3 MONTHS.AT NO POINT DID MR JEYABOLON MENTION THAT HE WAS THE OWNER/DPS.

I ASKED TO VIEW THE PROOF OF AGE TRAINING AND HE COULD NOT PROVIDE ME WITH ANY, I GOT THE IMPRESSION THAT HE HAD NOT UNDERTAKEN ANY PROOF OF AGE TRAINING. THERE WAS ONLY ONE SMALL POSTER PRESENT IN THE SHOP PROMOTING THE CHALLENGE OF AGE SCHEME. THE PREMISES LICENCE WAS NOT ON DISPLAY IN THE SHOP. THERE WAS NO REFUSALS BOOK IN PLACE AND THE TILL DID NOT CONTAIN AN EPOS SYSTEM.

TRADING STANDARDS PROVIDED MR JEYABOLON PAPERWORK ADVISING OF THE SALE AND DOCUMENTATION TO BE HANDED TO THE OWNER AND WE ADVISED THAT WE WOULD BE IN TOUCH IN RELATION TO THIS SALE AND BE INVITING THE DPS IN FOR A INTERVENTION MEETING.

I WAS MADE AWARE BY TRADING STANDARDS THAT AN INTERVENTION MEETING HAD BEEN ARRANGED WITH BELLS CONVENIENCE ON 1ST JUNE AND ASKED IF I WOULD ATTEND. THE USUAL PROCESS FOR THESE INTEVENTIONS ARE TO INVITE THE PREMISES LICENCE HOLDER AND THE DESIGNATED PREMISES SUPERVISOR FOR AN INFORMAL MEETING TO RUN THROUGH WHAT PROCESSES THEY HAVE IN PLACE NOW AND IF WE COULD GIVE ANY ADVICE ON HOW THEY COULD IMPROVE THE CURRENT PROCEDURES.

ON THE DAY MY JEYABOLAN ATTENDED AND CONFIRMED HIS NAME AS SORNALINGAM JEYABALAN ALONG WITH ANOTHER MALE SIUAKUMAN SIVATHARSAN AT FIRST I PRESUMED THAT THIS MALE WAS THE PLH/DPS AND IT BECAME CLEAR AFTER A SHORT TIME THAT HE WAS JUST A FRIEND OF JEYABALAN. WE ASKED WERE MR KHAN WAS AND THEY INFORMED US THAT THEY DIDN'T KNOW AND THAT MR JEYABALAN HAD BOUGHT THE BUISNESS BACK IN DECEMBER 2014 AND HE WAS RUNNING IT AND WAS TO BE THE DPS. I ASKED WHY HE HAD NOT DECLARED THIS TO THE COUNCIL IN RELATION TO CHANGE OF PREMISES LICENCE INTO HIS NAME, HE ALSO STATED THAT HE HAD NOT YET RECEIVED HIS PERSONNEL LICENCE THROUGH YET FROM BRENT COUNCIL SO HAD NOT CHANGED HIMSELF TO BE THE DPS. I EXPLAINED THAT THE LICENCE IS STILL SHOWING AS BEING IN MR KHANS NAME AND HE IS STILL RESPONSIBLE AS THE DPS FOR THE DAY TO DAY RUNNING OF THE BUISNESS.

MR JEYABALAN SHOWED SOME DOCUMENTATION THAT HE HAD TAKEN OVER THE STOCK OF THE PREMISES BUT NOTHING SHOWED THAT HE HAD TAKEN OVER THE PREMISES LICENCE. HE COULD ALSO NOT EXPLAIN WHY HE DIOD NOT INFORM US OF THIS ON THE EVENING OF THE SALE. I ASKED WHY MR SIVATHARSAN WAS WITH HIM AND HE STATED HE HAD NOTHING TO DO WITH THE PREMISES JUST CAME TO OFFER ANY SUPPORT.

THEY PROVIDED SOME DOCUMENTATION IN RELATION TO PROOF OF AGE WHICH STATES MR JEYABALAN HAD CONDUCTED PROOF OF AGE TRAINING ALTHOUGH THIS WAS NOT SHOWN ON THE EVENING, IT ALSO SHOWS THAT A SIGNED DOCUMENTATION TO AUTHORISE SALES BY MR KHAN AND UNDERNEATH THIS IS S.JEYABALAN WHICH CONFUSES ME SOMEWHAT WHY HE WOULD AUTHORISE SALES HE HE IS NO LONGER PART OF THE BUISNESS.

I HAVE GREAT CONCERNS IN RELATION TO THIS PREMISES AND DID LEAVE THEM ON THE NOTE THAT THEY SHOULD CHANGE THE PREMISES LICENCE AND DPS OVER ASAP. Officer: PC 3842 EVANS

I am Mark Marshall and am duly authorised to submit representations on behalf of the Licensing Authority.

On the 15th June 2015 a Licensing Enforcement Officer visited the premises and had concerns regarding the appointed DPS who was absent from the premises, other technical licensing issues were also disclosed, such as no summary on display, no certified copy of the licence and partially obscured or inadequate notices regarding minimisation of noise to residents.

An advisory letter was sent to Mr Amer KHAN, the licence holder at the time on the 23rd June 2015.

On Friday 17th July 2015 Mark Marshall, Licensing and Health and Safety Manager met with the new operator of Bells Convenience, Mr Jeyabalan SORNALINGAM and Gunaratnam KETHEES who arranged the meeting with me and was there to facilitate communication as Mr SORNALINGAM had very poor English language skills.

During the meeting it was apparent that Mr SORNALINGAM had been the owner of the shop since

January 2015, he didn't really understand the requirement to transfer the licence so during the meeting I assisted him by completing the forms for transferring the DPS and the Premises Licence into his name. It was very apparent from his character and lack of competence that Mr SORNALINGAM would be a concern if left to run this shop without assistance, it was very much accepted by all parties that Mr SORNALIGAM capabilities had limitations, I suggested that perhaps ordering stock, arranging displays, back office management would be ok but if he was left to do the operational day to day running of the premises I would be concerned. I suggested that he needed some assistance in the form of a shop manager; someone who understood the issues in the area could speak English fluently and had a stronger bearing. The transfer and change of DPS was submitted on the same day so the intentions of Mr SORNALIGAM are clearly honourable but many of the issues here such as the underage sale, technical licensing breaches and the fact that the licence was not transferred for over 6 months are in my view down to operator incompetence and the need for a competent manager is essential in this case. For New / Variation Applications only. It is recommended that the licence should only be granted if the application is amended, or if conditions are applied, as detailed below.

A visit to this premise on the 15th of June revealed the following issues;

1) A smashed socket in the shop area next to drinks live at >200Volts and a cable routed across a traffic route without any physical protection.




2) Cabling that requires further investigation.



3) In addition to the above the premise was in a very poor state of cleanliness.


The electrical socket was made safe by isolating at the consumer unit and a prohibition notice served to prevent use until made safe.

In addition to the prohibition notice improvement notices were served for an electrical condition report, PAT testing and cleaning of the premise.



A further visit was carried out to check compliance with the prohibition notice on the 1st of July 2015 and it was found to have been temporarily repaired with Sellotape and Gaffa tape and put back into action. There was still a large whole to the underneath of the socket exposing live electrical connections at >200Volts

The socket was again made safety by isolating at the consumer unit and this will now be reported for consideration of prosecution.



Mr Jeyabalan who was present during both visited stated as I was leaving that he was going to close the business as it was not making any money and that Blackpool council were too strict.
