Health and Wellbeing Board Development	This study by the Kings Fund indicates that generally boards are making good progress. Overall there are good relationships between local authorities and CCGs; most boards are led by a senior councillor and many have vice chairs from CCGs. The highest priorities in most boards relate to public health and health inequalities, but as yet there is 'little sign as yet that boards have begun to grapple with then immediate and urgent strategic challenges facing their local health and care services'. Boards recognise that they need to up their game from partnership forums to local leaders.
