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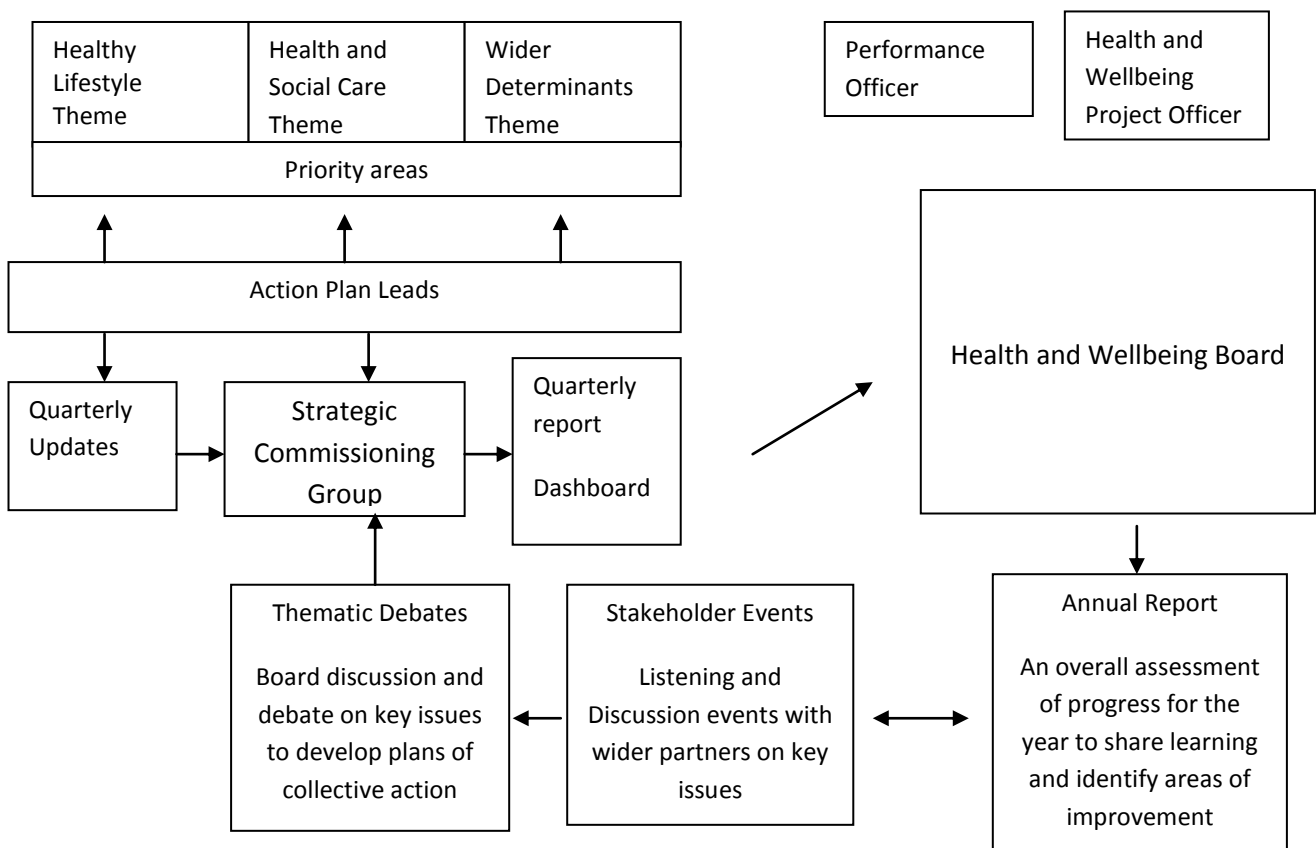
# Introduction

This document sets out a framework for monitoring the performance of Blackpool’s Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy. The framework draws together a selection of high level indicators and reporting mechanisms to report on progress against the three themes identified in the Strategy and is comprised of six interdependent components illustrated below:

## Key Features

- **Dashboard** providing a high level snapshot of key progress indicators
- **Quarterly action plan updates** from Action Plan leads responsible for collecting evidence of progress against an assigned priority area within each theme
- **Quarterly reports** from the Strategic Commissioning Group which provide a summary of progress against priority areas taken from Quarterly action plan updates
- **Exception report** highlighting unexpected trends both positive and negative
- **Thematic debates and stakeholder events** debate and discussion at Board meetings and discussion with the public, special interest groups and other organisations on the underlying principles of user experience, integration, financial stability
- **Annual Performance Assessment** bringing together quarterly reports and dashboard information

In order to assess the impact of the JHWS and achievement of our outcomes and priorities. The framework provides a balance quantitative and qualitative data. This is important as many of the overarching indicators can only be up-dated annually.



# Using the Framework

To establish a suitable indicator set the following sources were used where appropriate and where appropriate data were available:

- Public Health Outcomes Framework
- NHS Outcomes Framework
- Adult Social Care Outcomes Framework
- CCG Outcomes Framework
- CHIMAT Child Health Profiles

These indicators were then categorised into the three core themes identified in the health and wellbeing strategy:

- Healthy Lifestyles
- Health and Social Care
- Wider Determinants of Health

The complete list of all indicators is included in Appendix B for information.

In order to provide a more usable and relevant mechanism for monitoring the health and wellbeing strategy in Blackpool the Strategic Commissioning Group (advisory group to the Health and Wellbeing Board) identified a subset of key indicators from this list. These are presented as a performance summary dashboard, followed by more detailed analysis showing trends and comparisons to National and Regional areas where available. The remaining indicators in the outcomes frameworks will be monitored and assessed for inclusion in the framework at a later date as appropriate.

## Reporting arrangements and intervals

Information on key indicators will be provided to the Board on a quarterly and annual basis dependent on availability of data. Key indicators will be those that have wider implications for delivery of the Strategy and which focus areas of persistent concern.

For added rigour, more detailed information will be presented to the Strategic Commissioning Group on a wider range of indicators as detailed in Appendix B.

In addition, action plan leads will produce quarterly updates presented in full to the Strategic Commissioning Group. The Strategic Commissioning Group will use the information from the updates to compile a quarterly progress report which will be used to support the dashboard – the combination of high level data with local narrative will provide the Board with an overall picture of performance for the period. Exception reports will only be completed should the need arise.

## Accountability

Performance reports will be made accessible to members of the public via the Board’s website, Local Healthwatch and through voluntary and community sector. This will provide a mechanism for local people to hold the Board to account for the health outcomes we intend to achieve and enable an ongoing and open dialogue with the community.

In routinely examining progress against the Strategy and as part of the formal reporting process performance reports will be presented to Health Scrutiny, this will ensure appropriate challenge is made where there are particular areas of concern.

## Corporate priority reporting – Healthier Communities

As the overarching health strategy for Blackpool, the Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy makes an important contribution to councils’ overarching priorities. Key indicators set out in this performance framework will be used to report against the council’s health and wellbeing priority articulated through the Corporate Plan.

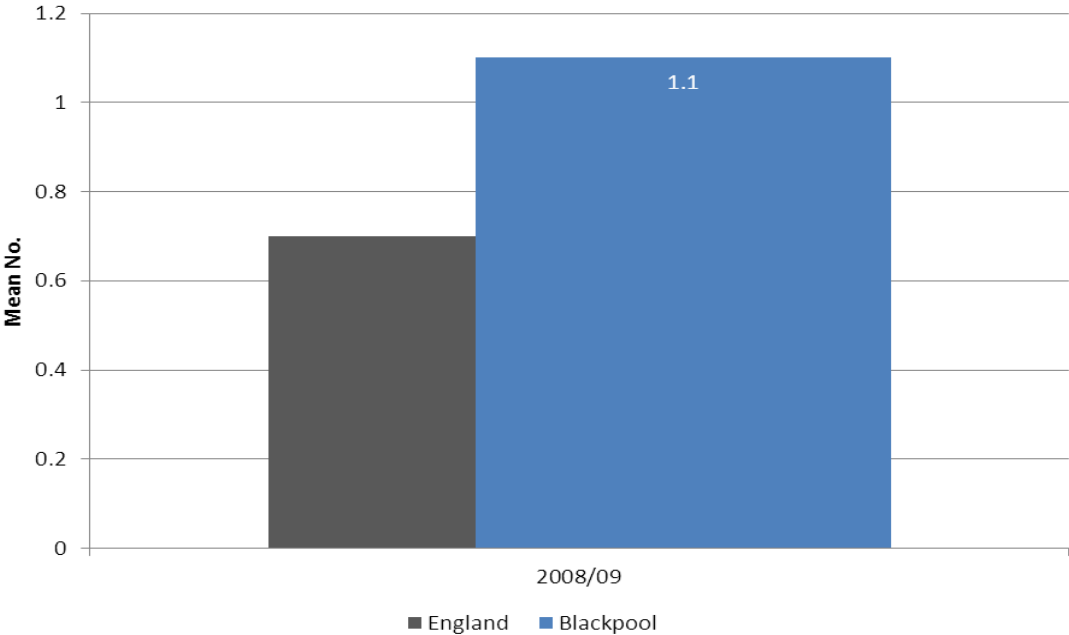

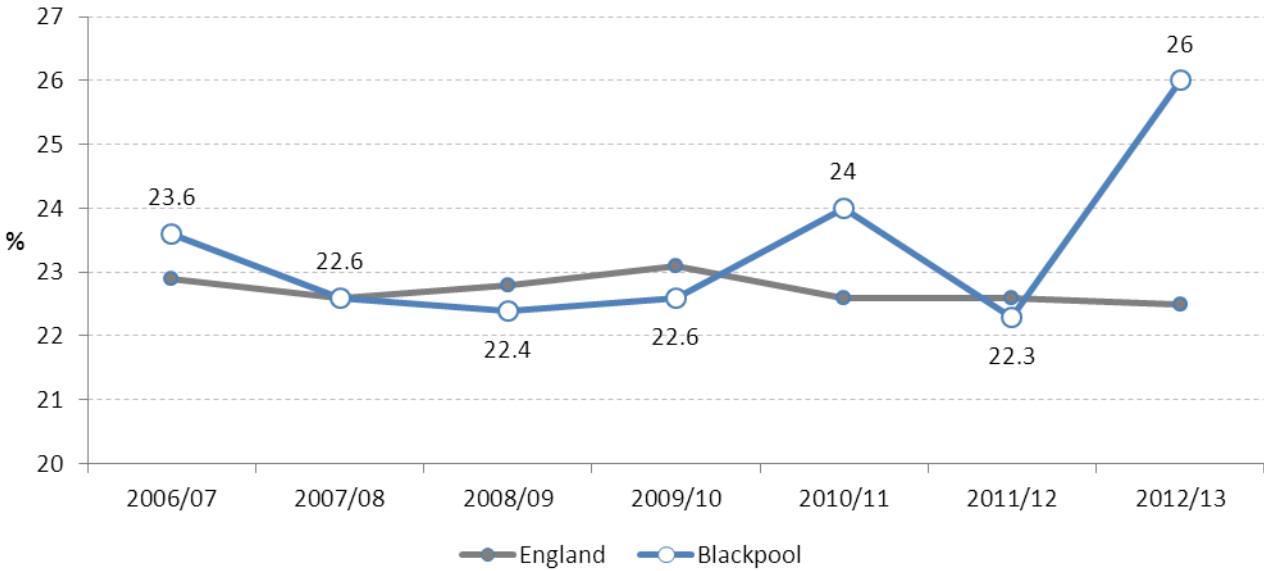

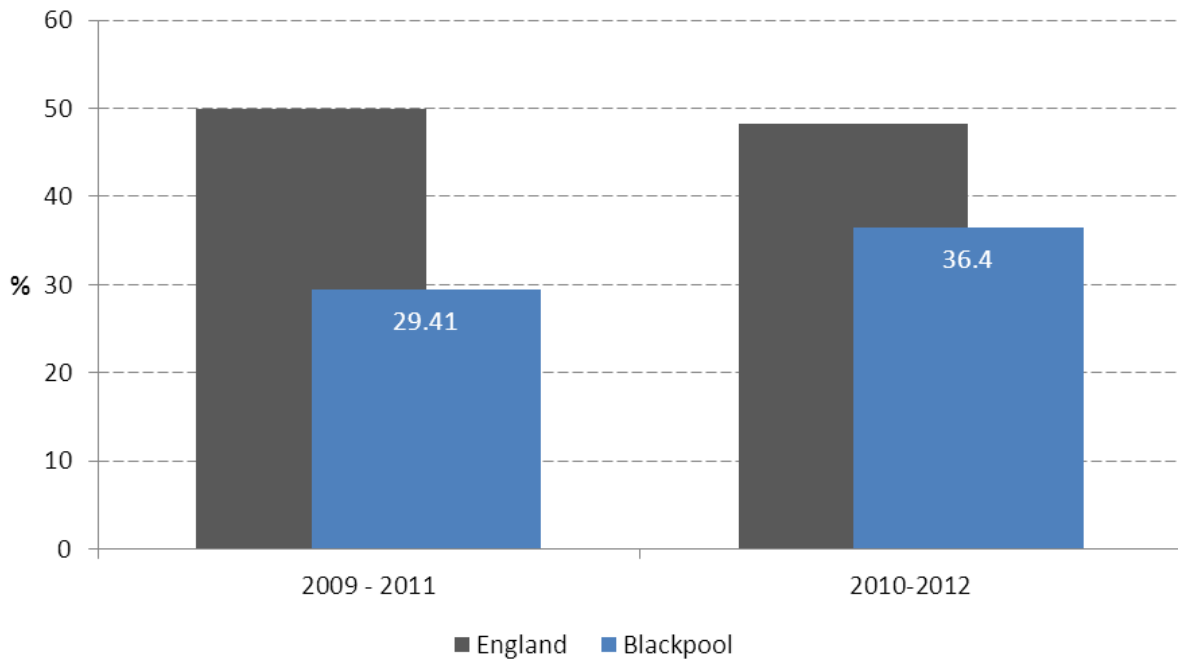

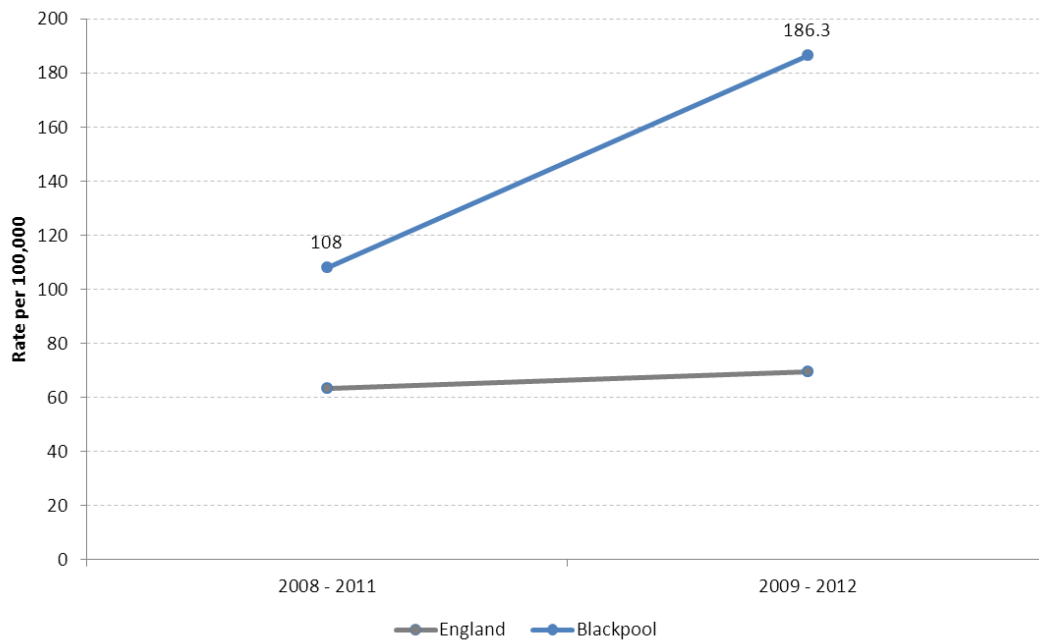
### Percentage of physically active and inactive adults



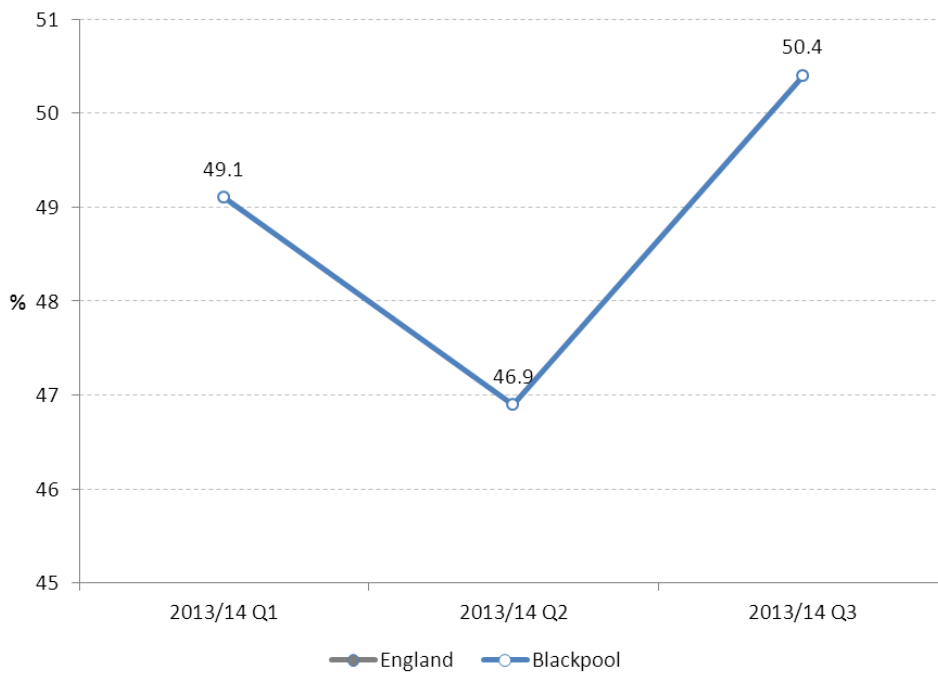
### Chlamydia Diagnosis (15 – 24 year olds) – CTAD

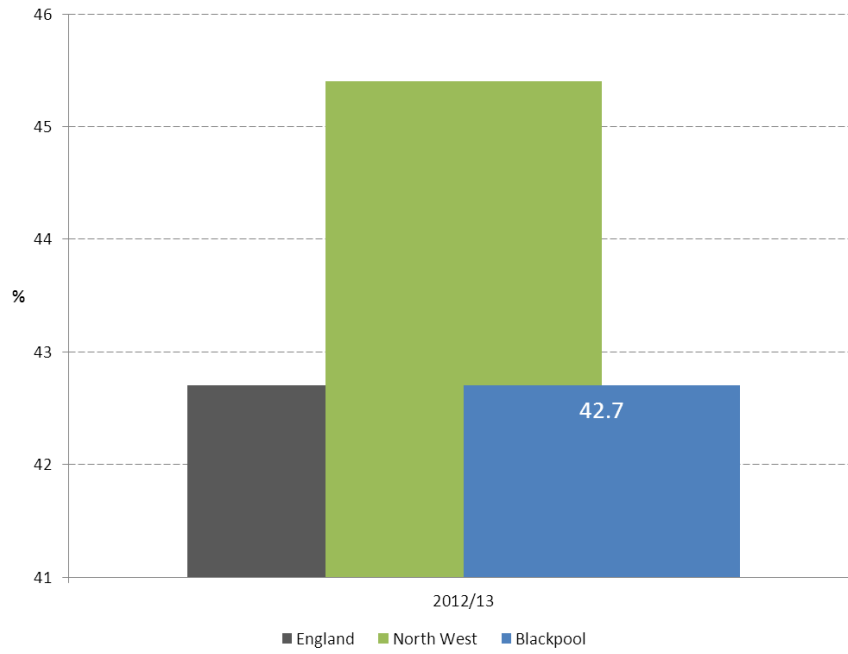
### Delayed transfers of care attributable to social care



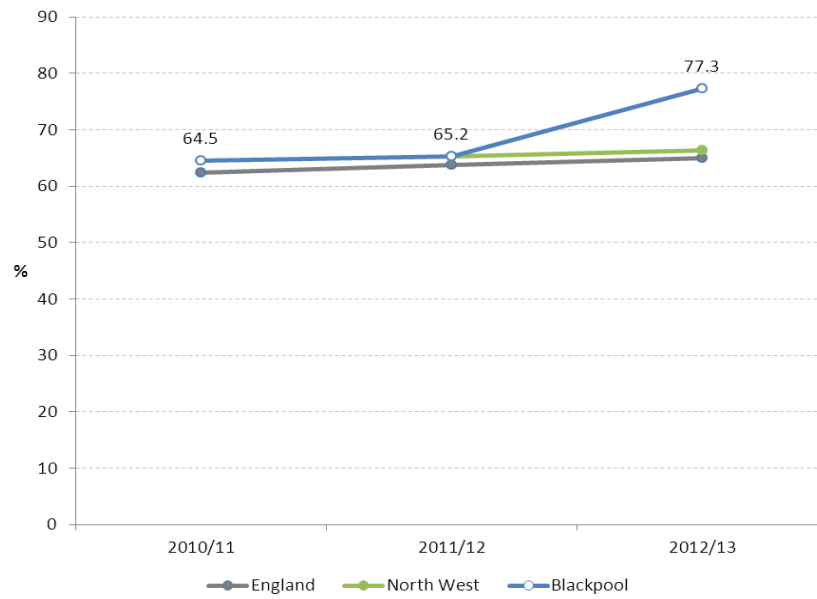

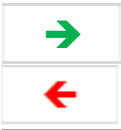


## Appendix A - Interpretation Notes

The performance dashboard summary shows all the indicators separated into the three core themes identified in the health and wellbeing strategy. To ensure the indicators are consistent they are adjusted so that the negative value is always displayed on the left of the spine chart and the positive value on the right. The column headings are explained below.

### Value

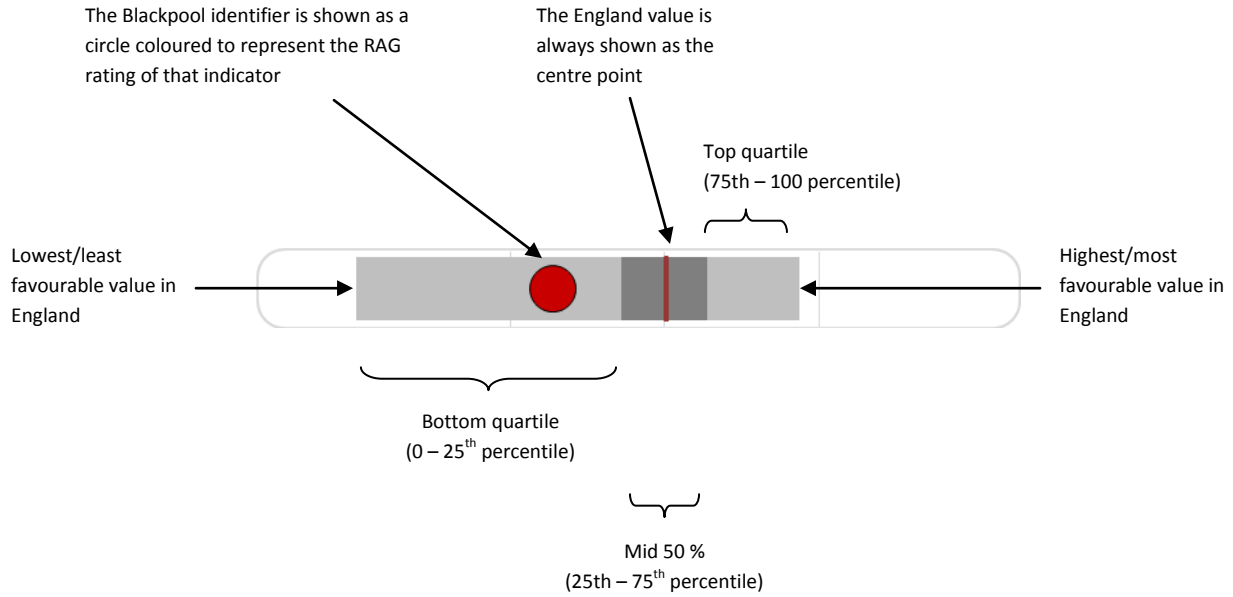
Blackpool's latest figure is shown with RAG highlighting, and this is generally associated with the following definitions:

- Red = Significantly less favourable than England
- Amber = Similar to England
- Green = Statistically more favourable than England

However please note that this information is not available for all indicators and with some indicators a different method is used and where appropriate the RAG rating is still applied. Also it is possible for an indicator to show amber whilst still being in the bottom quartile in the spine chart for example.

### Spine Chart

The spine chart shows how Blackpool compares to England and where available the top and bottom quartiles. The RAG rating is also shown on the Blackpool identifier.



The quartiles show the spread of results and provide a means of comparing Blackpool to England and other areas.

The latest available figures where appropriate (i.e. sometimes older values are used where there is better comparator information available) are shown for Blackpool, England and then the least favourable and most favourable results are shown.

### ***Data Year***

This shows the year of the data presented in the report. This is generally the most recent data available in the outcomes frameworks however the period varies between indicators, for example some indicators are displayed as an aggregate of 3 years.
