# APPLICATION TO VARY A PREMISES LICENCE – MARDI GRAS HOTEL, 41-43 LORD STREET, BLACKPOOL, FY1 2BD

### 1.0 Purpose of the report:

1.1 To consider an application to vary Premises Licence PL1566 issued in respect of the Mardi Gras Hotel, 41-43 Lord Street, Blackpool, FY1 2BD.

### 2.0 Recommendation(s):

2.1 The Panel is requested to consider the application and determine whether the granting of this variation would adversely impact on the licensing objectives.

### 3.0 Reasons for recommendation(s):

- 3.1 Representations have been received therefore there must be a hearing to determine the application.

### 4.0 **Background Information**

- 4.1 On 12 May 2020, the Licensing Service received an application from John Paul Street to vary the Premises Licence issued in respect of the Mardi Gras Hotel, 41-43 Lord Street, Blackpool.
- 4.2 The licence currently authorises the following licensable activities:

Exhibition of Films (indoors) – Mon-Sat 19.00-03.00, Sun 10.00-03.00 Recorded Music (indoors) – Mon-Sun 11.00-03.00 Entertainment of a Similar Description Mon-Sun 11.00-03.00 Sale of alcohol (for consumption "on" the premises) 24 hours a day

The provision of the above activities is currently subject to the following condition: "The hotel is open and licensable activities are available to residents and their bona fide guests only."

- 4.3 The application requests permission to allow up to 30 members of the public in to the premises at any one time to partake in permitted licensed activities. Initially this was requested until 02.00, but following discussions with the Police an agreement was made to reduce the terminal hour for non-residents to 00.30 (see 4.7 Observations below). A copy of the application as originally submitted is attached.
- 4.4 10 representations have been received from members of the public 5 in support and 5 in objection to the application. Copies of the representations are attached.

### 4.6 National policy considerations

9.43 – The authority's decision should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve.

### 4.7 **Observations**

This Premises Licence for the Mardi Gras Hotel was first granted in February 2006. The applicant, John Street, has been the Premises Licence holder since February 2020.

The conditions currently on the licence are as follows:

### **Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions**

- 1 No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence
  - a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence,

- b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2 Every supply of alcohol under the Premise Licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3 (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
  - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to -
    - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
    - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
  - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
  - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

- The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 5 (1) The Premises Licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the Premises Licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
  - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either a holographic mark, or an ultraviolet feature.
- 6 The responsible person must ensure that -
  - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks are sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures -
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
  - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
  - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.
- 7 (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
  - (2) In this condition:
    - a. "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P = D + (D x V), where
      - i. P is the permitted price,
      - ii. D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and

- iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- b. "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
- c. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a Premises Licence
  - i. the holder of the Premises Licence,
  - ii. the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
  - iii. the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- d. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- e. "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (3) Where the permitted price would not be a whole number of pennies, the permitted price shall be taken to be the price rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) Where the permitted price on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax, the permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### 8 Exhibition of films:

Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless the following applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendations made by that body.

Where -

a) The film classification body is not specified in the licence,

or

b) The relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this condition is applied to the film in question,

Admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.

### Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

- The hotel is open and licensable activities are available to residents and their bona fide guests only.
- The Licence holder is to support and rigorously enforce a Challenge 21 proof of age policy.

Any person who looks or appears to be under the age of 21 shall be asked to provide identification that they are over the age of 18. The following are the only forms of identification acceptable:

- i. UK photo driving licence
- ii. Passport
- iii. Proof of Age Standards Scheme Card
- 3 CCTV cameras shall be installed in all public drinking areas.
- Fire doors are to be kept clear at all times and checked regularly. All Health and Safety regulations are to be complied with in full.
- 5 No bookings are to be taken for children under the age of 16.
- Any persons aged between 16 18 years staying at the hotel will not be served alcohol and will not be permitted to take part in or view any other licensed activities.
- Noise from any regulated entertainment, mechanical ventilation or refrigeration plant shall be inaudible within the nearest sensitive properties or, at the discretion of the Local Authority, shall not exceed some other preagreed limit, which does not cause unreasonable disturbance to the residents of these properties or their guests.
- The volume of amplified sound used in connection with any regulated entertainment shall, at all times, be under the control of the Licensee or Management and the controlling mechanism shall be operated from a part of the premises inaccessible to the public.
- 9 All internal doors to any entrance / exit point, fire exit doors and external windows shall be closed during hours of any regulated entertainment except in the event of an emergency, save for the purpose of access and agress.

- 10 Vibration produced as a result of any regulated entertainment shall not be perceptible in any adjoining or nearby sensitive properties.
- There shall be placed at all exit points from the premises in a place where they can be seen and easily read by the public, clear and legible notices requiring customers to leave the premises and the area quietly so as to minimise disturbance to nearby residents.

Throughout the 28 day consultation period for this variation application, a number of amendments were made and conditions added to the application following discussions with Lancashire Constabulary and Environmental Protection. As a result of these agreements, no objections were received from any of the Responsible Authorities.

The agreement with Environmental Protection is to close the outside terrace/patio area for the consumption of alcohol at 22.00 (it may be used after this time as a smoking area). A similar condition was also agreed with the Police along with a number of other conditions (16 in total) as well as a reduction in the terminal hour for non-residents to 00.30. A copy of the Police mediation agreement is attached.

On 11 June the applicant, John Street, provided some further background information in regards to his application by email. Confirmation was received that live music will only take place up to 11pm as permitted for licensed premises under the Live Music Act. This is attached at Appendix 4(c).

At present we have a 24hr drinks licence and entertainment/music till 3am for residents and their guests, we have no adjoining property to the right of us and a hallway, wall and door separating us from the property on the left. We are catering for a safe space for the lgbt community and their straight friends. We wish to be able to serve drinks to selected members of the public who fit into this group of clientele. We would like a maximum of 30 members of the public at any one time to be able to come in and watch entertainment and have a drink. We are on Lord Street, which already has a few hotels with the facility of allowing non -residents in for drinks etc. We have a key only entry to the hotel and any members of the public who did want to visit would need to be let in by staff via a doorbell and sign in a visitors book for health and safety and security. Consumption of alcohol will still be ON the premises only.

To provide a safe and secure place for a maximum of 30 lesbian, bisexual, gay and trans-gender customers and their straight friends as non-residents, by invitation of the staff or myself by ringing the doorbell at the door and assessing their suitability for a mixed bar ( and numbers already inside), this would allow a few non residents to enjoy our facilities with their friends in a safe place, there would be no open door policy that would allow letting anyone to walk in off the street, and a record of non-residents via a signing in book for health and safety and security, thus stopping drunk, aggressive or criminal behaviour.
b) The prevention of crime and disorder
Controlled entry by having people press doorbell before allowed access and sign visitors book and also limit non-residents to 30 people, cctv on doorway recording 24hrs
c) Public safety
Only allowing non-residents until 2am, an hour before our music is lowered and wound down. Providing free calls to taxi companies where needed
d) The prevention of public nuisance
Outside terrace locked from 2am to all in hotel at weekends and at midnight weekdays, free taxis phoned for people, 30 maximum non-residents allowed, notices on behaviour when leaving hotel
e) The protection of children from harm
no under 16s allowed in hotel, except where a special events licence is applied for, ie: dance competitions, bar has electric shutter to cordon off whole area and gaming machines would be unplugged

In terms of specific **regulated entertainments** please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman

Thank you for doing this so quickly I appreciate it.

Could you please just confirm that you have signed the attached photo in order to add the below 17 conditions to the operating schedule then I will send this to Blackpool Council (just a quick email reply):

### The following changes to licensable activity:

Non-residents may be served alcohol and may engage in all permitted licensable activities until 00:30hrs daily. There are no restrictions on the hours during which intoxicants can be served to residents.

### The following conditions to be added to the operating schedule:

1. After 00:30hrs intoxicating liquor shall not be sold or supplied on the premises otherwise than to persons residing there or their private friends, bona fide entertained by them at their own expense, and for consumption by such a person or his private friend so entertained by them on the premises. A Guest Book will be maintained, wherein the names of guests (and the residents of whom they are a guest) will be duly recorded.

- A controlled entry system will be in place to ensure access to non-residents is limited. Non-residents will be required to sign a visitor's book which will be available for inspection by an authorised officer on request.
- 3. Any outside area which is used for the consumption of alcohol shall cease to be so used at 22:00hrs. All tables and chairs in the outside area shall either be fixed to the floor or be stacked, secured and covered no more than 30 minutes after the time at which patrons are no longer permitted to consume drinks in the area.
- 4. The outside area of the venue will be regularly checked by a competent person.
- 5. Frequent collection of glasses and bottles will be undertaken to ensure that empty containers do not accumulate in or around the licensed premises.
- 6. Appropriate measures will be taken to ensure staff prevent the removal of bottles or glasses from the curtilage and grounds of the licensed premises or any outside area under the control of the premises licence holder.
- 7. Another member of staff shall be nominated to act for the DPS in their absence whose identity is known by all staff when such absence occurs.
- 8. At least one personal licence holder will be contactable at all times the premises is open (whose identity will be known to all other staff engaged in the supply or sale of alcohol) except in the case of emergency.
- 9. An authorisation of sales, signed and dated by the DPS, shall be kept at the premises showing all persons authorised by them to make sales of alcohol at the premises.
- 10. Security/staff arrangements will be sufficient to discourage the sale and consumption of drugs and shall ensure such arrangements include regular documented checks of toilets.
- 11. An incident book will be maintained in which shall be recorded:
  - i.All incidents of crime and disorder
  - ii. Refused sales to suspected under-age and drunken persons
  - iii. A record of any person asked to leave the premises or removed from the premises
  - iv. Details of occasions on which the police are called to the premises
  - v. A record of persons searched on suspicion that drugs are being carried and the reason for such suspicion
    - The book will be available for inspection by a police officer.
- 12. All external windows and doors should be closed after 10pm, except in the case of an emergency.
- 13. Functions which specifically target young people aged 17-18 years (for example birthday parties) will not be allowed to take place on the premises.
- 14. All members of staff shall receive suitable training with regard to serving drunks and are to receive regular refresher training at intervals of a maximum of 6 months, records to evidence this will be made available to authorised officer upon request.
- 15. All staff involved in the sale of alcohol shall receive suitable training in relation

to proof of age scheme to be applied upon the premises. All staff are to receive regular refresher training at intervals of at least 6 months. Records to evidence this will be made available to officers upon request.

16. A Challenge 25 proof of age policy shall be implemented and adhered to. Any person who looks or appears to be under the age of 25 shall be asked to provide identification that they are over the age of 18. The following are the only forms of identification acceptable:

A recognised proof of age scheme accredited under the British Retail Consortiums Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS).

Photo driving licence.

Passport.

Official ID card issued by HM Forces or European Union bearing a photograph and date of birth of the holder.

If no suitable identification is provided the sale of alcohol to them will be refused.

17.CCTV will be installed internally and externally at the premises and will comply with the following:

i)The CCTV system shall be installed, maintained and operated to the reasonable satisfaction of Lancashire Constabulary. All public areas of the premises are to be covered by the system. The system will incorporate a camera covering the entrance door and will be capable of providing an image which is regarded as identification standard.

ii)The system will display the correct date and time

- iii) The system will make recordings during all hours the premises are open to the public
- iv) Digital recordings shall be held for a minimum of 21 days after the recording is made and will be made available to the Police or any authorised persons for inspection upon request.
- v) The system will, as a minimum, record images of the head and shoulders of all persons entering the premises.
- vi) A staff member who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system will be on the premises at all times the premises are open to the public. 

I would like to make a representation to the Licensing Committee to refuse the application for a Public Licence at the Mardi Gras Hotel, 41-43 Lord Street, Blackpool.

My reasons fall into two categories:

The Prevention of Nuisance
The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

I am a long term resident and business owner of the Apollo Hotel, 26 Lord Street, directly opposite the Mardi Gras hotel. My explanation below covers these two categories.

In the time I have been here, I have had numerous problems with both noise from drunken guests and from very loud music being played in this bar, especially at the weekend. Unfortunately, they use the small enclosed outside balcony as a smoking area, this means they open and close the doors almost constantly letting entertainment noise out. People tend to be very loud when drunk and have no consideration for residents and guests in the surrounding properties. They flick their cigarette ends into the street and road and have used the side alley at the side of my property as a toilet.

Lord Street has always been a place of small B and B's in a predominantly gay area where people behave very well and does not, in my opinion, lend itself to public licensed premises as there are three or four public gay bars within 200 metres. Guests have complained about the noise from the Mardi Gras before and have said that they will not stay with me again because of this. If this license is granted, it will obviously affect my business. The only other public licensed bar on my part of Lord Street has caused a lot of problems with noise and bad behaviour on the street by patrons and the police and council having to visit them on numerous occasions. I think we could very well face the same problems if this licence is granted.

We wish to make representation under the Licensing Act 2003 against the above Licensing Register for the promotion of the following licensing objectives:-

- The Prevention of Nuisance
- 2. The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The part of Lord Street where the Mardi Gras Hotel is located (between Banks Street and Springfield Road) is a mix of residential and holiday accommodation. There are 12 small guest houses, which are all occupied by the owners, 4 self-catering holiday units and 3 residential buildings with a total of 28 self-contained residential flats.

Currently, 1 non-residential premises licence has been granted to a guest house on this part of the street.

#### The Prevention of Nuisance

If this non-residential premises licence is granted, there would be a significant increase in noise and vibration caused by members of the public entering and exiting the premises. The property, which sleeps up to 46 persons, could have its footfall increased by a further 30 non-residential persons at any one time. This may be increased further with the arrival of other non-residential customers waiting at the entrance. Such large numbers will inevitably cause a noise nuisance to neighbouring properties.

We share an internal wall with Mardi Gras Hotel and our entrance is adjoining theirs. Because the walls are relatively thin and not soundproofed, the continual foot traffic from the extra non-residential visitors will inevitably cause an intolerable nuisance to ourselves and our guests.

Considerable noise will be generated in the street by people being on the external terrace, whether drinking, sitting or smoking, potentially until midnight on weekdays and 02.00 am at weekends. The inevitable noise will cause a nuisance to both neighbours and our guests and, therefore, to our business.

Following the recent non-residential premises licence being granted to a guest house on our street, it immediately led to a significant noise nuisance to neighbours, particularly to those living in connected properties due to the nature and fabric of the buildings. Although this licence is not currently being operated, when it was operational, many guests were disturbed by the noise and complained about it.

#### 2. The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

There will be continual issues with members of the public arriving and leaving late at night when guests and ourselves are trying to relax or sleep. Without doubt, there is every likelihood that it will cause disorder and breaches of the peace.

Because the licence holder is not responsible for conduct of individuals once they leave the vicinity of their property, the granting of this licence will simply add to the frequency of crime and disorder on our street. The character of this street should remain as a combined residential and holiday area for guest houses and we do not wish it to be

turned into a 'drinking' street, especially when there will be no security staff, or public CCTV outside the vicinity of the Mardi Gras Hotel.

The granting of the other non-residential premises licence certainly led to anti-social behaviour on this normally quiet street, including shouting, swearing, and, occasionally, public urination. Although this was not the fault of the owners, there were many complaints from guests who felt unsafe returning at night because of the anti-social behaviour.

\*\*\*\*

In summary, if this non-residential premises licence is granted, it would be a major threat to our own wellbeing and livelihood, to the enjoyment of our facilities by our guests and to the character of this street. It will cause increased noise nuisance and anti-social behaviour.

We therefore ask you not to grant the variation licence of the Mardi Gras Hotel.



**Dear Licensing Committee,** 

Licence Objection - Mardi Gras Hotel 41-43 Lord Street Blackpool.

I wish to object to the application for a public licence by the above premises, particularly in relation to public nuisance and the prevention of crime and disorder.

I would support the granting of a licence but only in respect that it enables alcohol to be provided to residents and their guests.

There have previously been problems in this street with another property [FERNLEA 25 Lord Street] when these premises operated with a public licence. This was the subject of considerable discussion at meetings held by the North Central Business Action Group and addressed regularly by the Head of Public Protection Mr Tim Coglan.

No matter what the best intentions there may be stated by the applicant, why is there a need for a public licence ?

This property, although within the designated holiday area, it is primarily for residential use. The public visit for residential use and not to premises that are commercially open to the public or to provide entertainment.

Noise echoes considerably in this area and even being a short distance from this property, noise would be heard quite clearly, more so during the night time when there is less residual noise from traffic and everyday life.

When Pier Jam events and Promenade Concerts take place, they can be heard clearly and these venues are even further away.

Most local residents, whether hoteliers or not, take the issue of noise and unruly behaviour extremely seriously as it effects our lives, sleep needs and livelihoods. Excessive noise reflects greatly on repeat business.

Even some hotels with a hotel licence have had their licences reviewed and limited for excessive noise. [The Lark Inn – Licensing Panel 6<sup>th</sup> September 2011] Supported by Mr Mark Marshall Blackpool Council and Lancashire Constabulary.

In these difficult times, particularly as these premises have been closed and unoccupied for some considerable time, I wish the new occupants every success, but clearly a change of use in respect of private verses pubic use in respect of the provision of alcohol and entertainments clearly needs to be carefully considered.

If events are going to be a regular occurrence, I would additionally suggest that a limit of 12 midnight be imposed to utilise the outside area as this is relatively small and allowing the double doors to be open after this time would enable considerable noise to emanate. The requirement for CCTV to be in operation at all times to monitor events would additionally support adhesion to any rules and regulations imposed.

I would support the granting of a licence to provide alcohol to residents and their limited guests only in the first instance, with restrictions. If that works satisfactorily, it could be reviewed after a period of 12 months perhaps.

The provision of a public licence merely allows for the premises to become more commercial with the outcome of more people being attracted into the area who might otherwise utilise the many existing establishments in the town.
