FEES AND CHARGES FOR WASTE SERVICES 2021/22

1.0 Purpose of the report:

1.1 The proposed Community and Environmental Services fees and charges for Waste Services 2021/22.

2.0 Recommendation(s):

2.1 To agree to the Community and Environmental Services fees and charges for Waste Services for 2021/22, detailed in Appendix A with effect from the 1 April 2021 to the 31 March 2022.

3.0 Reasons for recommendation(s):

- 3.1 The fees and charges from 2020/21 have been reviewed in order to take account of the costs of providing the service, business development, inflation, the Council's budget requirements and local market conditions.
- 3.2 Is the recommendation contrary to a plan or strategy adopted or No approved by the Council?
- 3.3 Is the recommendation in accordance with the Council's approved Yes budget?

None. Analysis, assessment and benchmarking exercises against neighbouring authorities and local market conditions have been carried out in order to arrive at the proposed fees and charges.

6.0 Background Information

- 6.1 The Community and Environmental Services fees and charges relate to the following services within the department:
 - Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC)
 - Domestic Waste Services including subscription Green Waste
 - Bulky Waste Collection (Bulky Matters)
 - Special Collections
- 6.2 In relation to the review process of the fees and charges, the services operate within a framework underpinned by the following key pieces of legislation:
 - The Local Government Act 2003
 - The Civic Amenities Act 1967
 - The Local Authorities (Prohibition of charging residents to deposit household waste) Order 2015
 - The Environmental Protection Act 1990
 - Controlled Waste Regulations 2012

- 6.3 Any increase to charges have recognised the need to reduce waste going to landfill and relate to those wastes which are generally not collected via the fortnightly refuse and recycling collection provision.
- 6.4 Bulky waste collections are delivered in conjunction with a third sector provider, as well is in partnership with Wyre Borough Council, and the proposed service charges are designed to remain affordable and allow residents a flexible and readily accessible service to residents to dispose of their bulky waste responsibly.
- 6.5 The green waste subscription service was introduced in 2016 and has continued to maintain a stable client base of circa 10,000 customers. The rate has not been uplifted this year as the current rate is in line with neighbouring authorities charges and ensures that the cost of provision is met while any surplus realised is applied to off-set other waste related pressures, i.e. at the Household Waste Recyling Centre.
- 6.6 In terms of the charges for 2021/22, while there is no uplift there will be a pro-rata rate for in-year renewals to compensate for lost collections as a result of the suspension period over the first lockdown. This is shown in Appendix A.
